We build informational resources and guides to assist our members




- Identifies federal funding opportunities that address flooding and sea level rise

Building a regional resilience collaborative





What is a regional resilience collaborative?

- Formal partnership to work together to improve the resilience of the communities within the footprint of Apalachee Regional Planning Council
- Bring together a diverse set of stakeholders, including local officials, nonprofit organizations, academic institutions, agencies, and businesses to create unified goals and a vision for the region

A successful example: East Central Florida

- Through the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council, a formal resilience collaborative was created
- Developed an MOU and have brought together 25 counties & cities, as well as 6 regional organizations/agencies
- The goal was a recommitment to regionalism and to develop a structure and framework to approach regional resilience







What can a regional collaborative offer?

Increased capacity

Many local governments do not have the resources to address the challenges of resilience alone. Through regional collaboration, participants can benefit from shared resources

Regional planning standards

Water does not care about political boundaries. A regional approach allows for cost-savings, a clear standard for the private sector, and reduction of duplicative efforts

Louder voice together

Regions that work together have a louder voice on issues of importance. Given the groups proximity to Tallahassee, a unified voice would be even more powerful

Collaboration on projects & studies

Through a regional partnership, local governments can reduce cost of projects and studies by working together

More competitive funding applications

When applying for funding, regional collaboratives have been quite successful, and many agencies note their encouragement for regional approaches



How can AFC support a regional resilience collaborative?

- Resources and time: Full-time staff of 15 and will offer a small grant to help jumpstart
 the collaborative
- Connections in Florida and across the country: 220 coalition members in 19 states, and deep roots in Florida
- **Develop messaging:** Assist with messaging of the collaborative, especially in more rural areas; can also provide graphic design support for branding







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
